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## President's Message

Members of the Academy of Psychosomatic Medicine have much to look forward to in the coming year. We have made excellent progress in the past six months in pursuit of our goals of subspecialty status for Psychosomatic Medicine, preparation of a superb educational program for this fall's Annual Meeting, and strengthening the Academy. It is a great pleasure to work with the very talented group of fellow psychiatrists who serve on the Council and the various committees, and to have an opportunity to review the submissions for new membership, fellowship, and awards—there's a wealth of ability, energy, and dedication among our membership. Groucho Marx once said that he wouldn't want to be a member of any club that would be willing to have him. We, on the other hand, can be proud to belong to a group of wonderful colleagues who are doing remarkable professional work. I would like to highlight just a few of the current goings-on of the Academy.

First, with respect to subspecialization, we expect to have our application reviewed at the American Board of Medical Specialties meeting this fall. Formally, the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology will be presenting the application; Doctor Steven Scheiber of ABPN has been our "point man" for the process, and he has championed our cause vigorously. So far, we've had encouraging feedback about the reactions of the other societies and boards that will be voting on the presentation. Surgeons, internists, pediatricians—pretty much everyone "gets it." We expect to receive formal ABMS approval either this fall or next spring. Preparation of a board exam will follow.

With respect to this fall's Annual Meeting, our Education Committee, chaired by Christine Skotzko, MD, has assembled a great program.

Our first plenary session will focus on the big picture of psychiatry's place in American medicine in 2002, and on the intellectual and economic challenges for consultation-liaison work and psychosomatic medicine. Doctor Paul Appelbaum, President of APA, will be the keynote speaker. Our second plenary session will address the meeting theme, "Consultation-Liaison Psychiatry: Humane and Scientific," with descriptions of clinically important scientific advances in psychobiology, including clinical uses of attachment theory, psychotherapy with the seriously medically ill, and brain imaging of emotion. We will have some truly outstanding speakers. This year's Hackett Award winner, Doctor James Strain of Mt. Sinai Medical Center in New York, one of the true giants of consultation-liaison psychiatry, has greatly enriched all of us with his innumerable contributions to the theory and practice of our work. His lecture should be an intellectual and emotional high point of this year's meeting. We will also have a chance to learn about some remarkable innovations in training from the winner of this year's Stoudermire Award and hear an exciting talk about a sustained program of superb clinical neuropsychiatric investigation from the winner of this year's Research Award. And, we will continue the very successful symposia providing a review of consultation-liaison psychiatry.

Some concerns that we have to address as an organization include maintaining and expanding our membership, long-term financial planning, and our relationship with the committee structure within the American Psychiatric Association that deals with consultation-liaison and psychosomatic medicine. Many of our council members will be devoting substantial effort to these concerns in the coming year. We are fortunate to have their commitment and expertise put to our service.

It has been a privilege to serve as the President of the Academy this year. I look forward to seeing as many of you as possible at our meeting in Tucson in November.

## Application for Psychosomatic Medicine Subspecialization

The Academy office has received numerous inquiries from members regarding the status of the APM's proposal seeking subspecialization status for Psychosomatic Medicine.

You are probably aware that we have made tremendous strides and have crossed the first hurdle by gaining support of the Am-

erican Board of Psychiatry and Neurology (ABPN) in late 2001. Although this was certainly a critical step in our recognition request, the battle is still far from over. So what next?

The ABPN will submit the application to the ABMS.COCERT (Committee on Certification, Subcertification, and Recertification) for review. COCERT will have an open hearing on the Wednesday before the September, 2002 Assembly meeting of the ABMS. They may have suggested changes at that time for ABPN to consider. The proposal will go for a second hearing on the Wednesday before the March 2003 Assembly meeting at which time they will make a recommendation to the Assembly and the Executive Committee for the Thursday meeting. It must pass by a two-thirds vote of the Assembly. It will be critical that ABPN muster the support of the primary care boards (i.e., internal medicine, family practice, and pediatrics), as they have 48% of the 107 votes.

Once the proposal passes the ABMS, the ABPN will start the five-year grandfathering of candidates to take the exam. There are no grandfathering provisions to not take an exam, only grandfathering regarding ACGME training. The ABPN President will appoint a steering committee and a written (computer) exam committee to work on the content outline and the test questions.

ABPN then submits a request to the RRC for psychiatry to work on the training requirements. This is then circulated to the field and to other RRCs for comment and criticism. The RRC then makes any necessary changes and submits them to the ACGME for its approval.

The accreditation process takes about 1½ years on average after the RRC receives the ABPN request. If approved, then programs can be reviewed. Training directors of programs must be board certified by ABPN (or in rare instances, have equivalent qualifications).

# Evolution of a Psychiatric Subspecialty

[In case you missed it, the following is a reprint of an article appearing in the March 2002 issue of *PSYCHIATRIC TIMES* in which Doctor Levenson explores the history of Psychosomatic Medicine and its ever-increasing importance in patient care. The article is also an excellent historical document on the evolution of the Academy of Psychosomatic Medicine. Much of the information contained in this article was presented to the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology by Doctor Levenson on behalf of the Academy's proposal for subspecialization.]

Over the last several decades, the field of psychosomatic medicine has blossomed, with a myriad of exciting directions for research. Consultation-liaison (C-L) psychiatry is the clinical arm of psychosomatic medicine—the purview of psychiatrists interested in mind-body interactions at the interface between psychiatry and the rest of medicine.

## History

The poet Samuel Taylor Coleridge may have been the first to define the English word psychosomatic. However, the development of the field in the United States can be traced to grants provided by the Rockefeller Foundation in the mid-1930s that were used to open psychosomatic units at several academic medical centers, including Massachusetts General Hospital, Duke University and the University of Colorado. The goal of these grants was to bring psychiatric services into general medical hospitals, since the psychiatric needs of the medically ill had been almost entirely neglected. The American Psychosomatic Society was founded in 1936, and the Academy of Psychosomatic Medicine was founded in 1954. During the 1970s, the National Institute of Mental Health recognized the need to further develop training programs in C-L psychiatry and provided a series of training grants to develop expert clinician-teachers in the field. During the 1980s, the NIMH similarly targeted the development of C-L and psychosomatic research as a high priority. The NIMH provided a series of research training workshops for C-L psychiatrists to develop a cadre of clinician-investigators and provided millions of dollars of funding specifically for C-L research.

By 1991, there were 55 fellowships for psychiatrists in C-L psychiatry and psychosomatic medicine in the United States. In 1992, the Academy of Psychosomatic Medicine submitted an application to the

American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology (ABPN), with the endorsement of the American Psychiatric Association, requesting recognition as an official subspecialty. Unfortunately, at that time, the American Board of Medical Specialties (ABMS) declared a moratorium, which has subsequently been lifted, on any new medical subspecialties. The Academy of Psychosomatic Medicine (in conjunction with the Association of Medicine and Psychiatry) reapplied to the ABPN. The APA reaffirmed its support, and the proposal has also been supported by the Association of Directors of Psychiatric Residency Training. After reviewing the proposal, the ABPN voted to apply to ABMS for permission to issue certification in the subspecialty of psychosomatic medicine.

## The Literature

This area of subspecialty within psychiatry is represented in numerous journals. Broad coverage of the field can be found in *Psychosomatics and Psychosomatic Medicine*, as well as in *Journal of Psychosomatic Research*, *General Hospital Psychiatry*, *International Journal of Psychiatry in Medicine*, *Advances in Psychosomatic Medicine*, and *Psychotherapy and Psychosomatics*. Research by C-L psychiatrists is also published in general medical and specialized journals (e.g., *Psycho-oncology*).

Classic texts have played a key role in integrating diverse knowledge as well as setting an agenda and redirecting the field. Early examples include Dunbar's *Emotions and Bodily Changes* (1935), Weiss and English's *Psychosomatic Medicine* (1943), and Alexander's *Psychosomatic Medicine* (1950). More recent classics include Lishman's *Organic Psychiatry* and Hackett and Cassem's *Massachusetts General Hospital Handbook of General Hospital Psychiatry*. The two most com-

prehensive texts guiding the field today are Stoudemire et al's *Psychiatric Care of the Medical Patient* and Rundell and Wise's *The American Psychiatric Press Textbook of Consultation-Liaison Psychiatry*. Consultation-liaison psychiatrists also have written many more specialized texts that have been very influential in clinical practice, including Holland's *Psycho-oncology*, Chochinov and Breitbart's *Handbook of Psychiatry in Palliative Medicine*, and Trzepacz and DiMartini's *The Transplant Patient*.

Because C-L psychiatrists work with other medical practitioners, they have taken the primary role in developing key national practice guidelines including the APA's *Practice Guideline for the Treatment of Patients With Delirium*, as well as the *Practice Guideline for the Treatment of Patients With HIV/AIDS*. Consultation-liaison psychiatrists were also instrumental in the development of the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality's *Guideline for Depression in Primary Care* as well as the *Guideline for Management of Cancer Pain*. They have also helped develop national curricula for the American College of Physicians and the American Society for Clinical Oncology, as well as many other national organizations.

## Professional Organizations

The Academy of Psychosomatic Medicine is the primary home for American C-L psychiatrists, although its membership also includes psychiatrists from many other countries. Consultation-liaison psychiatrists are also very active in a number of other organizations, including the American Psychosomatic Society, the Association of Medicine and Psychiatry, the American Association of General Hospital Psychiatrists, and the Association for Academic Psychiatry (C-L section). There are also a number of national organizations

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focused on more specialized areas within C-L psychiatry such as the American Society of Psychosocial and Behavioral Oncology/AIDS and the American Neuropsychiatric Association. In the APA, C-L psychiatrists have played leading roles and they also participate in the organizations of other medical specialties.

Consultation-liaison psychiatry and psychosomatic medicine are also recognized and practiced as an organized international subspecialty. Major organizations include the International Organization for Consultation-Liaison Psychiatry, the European Association for Consultation-Liaison Psychiatry and Psychosomatics, the International College of Psychosomatic Medicine, and the General Hospital Psychiatry Section of the World Psychiatric Association. There are also more specialized internal groups such as the International Psychoneurology Society.

#### Clinical Services

There are currently about 1,500 American psychiatrists who primarily practice C-L psychiatry, although consultation constitutes a part of the practice of a much larger number of psychiatrists. The field has been growing continuously over the past 10 years. Before 1991, there were less than 200 graduates of C-L fellowships. Since then, almost 600 more psychiatrists have completed fellowships in C-L psychiatry and psychosomatics. There are currently 32 fellowship training programs recognized by the Academy of Psychosomatic Medicine, training up to 66 fellows per year.

Whereas all psychiatrists treat patients who may also have comorbid medical illnesses, C-L psychiatrists focus on the more complex medically ill, e.g., patients in intensive care units, dialysis centers, transplant programs, burn units and HIV/AIDS clinics. There will never be enough C-L specialists to provide all the needed consultations requested by non-psychiatric physicians and that is why C-L psychiatry has focused its efforts on seeing the more difficult patients in the more difficult locations.

Consultation-liaison psychiatrists constitute a major referral source for other psychiatrists working with both inpatients and outpatients. For example, the Massa-

chusetts General Hospital Psychosomatic Service's Primary Care Initiative makes 5,400 referrals per year to outpatient psychiatrists in the Boston area. A C-L initiative at the University of North Carolina doubled the direct admissions to their inpatient unit. Consultation-liaison psychiatrists staff hospital psychiatric consultation services, medical psychiatry inpatient units and primary care clinics throughout the United States.

#### Education and Training

The knowledge base in psychosomatic medicine and C-L psychiatry is broad and complex. Consultation-liaison psychiatrists are on the front lines of teaching psychiatry to third-year medical students and general residents in psychiatry. They also provide education and training to residents in primary care specialties, as well as continuing medical education regarding psychiatric aspects of general medical practice to other physicians.

#### The Future

The frontiers of C-L psychiatry and psychosomatic medicine are the frontiers of all the medical specialties, since each new advance in treatment raises new issues of diagnosis, management and adaptation. Research directions for this subspecialty field of psychiatry lie in a number of exciting areas including psychoimmunology, psychoendocrinology, psycho-oncology, psychocardiology, and health services research. Consultation-liaison psychiatry will continue to enhance the education and training of a wide variety of trainees, evolve as a scholarly discipline and, most important of all, contribute to the provision of better patient care.

The award was presented to Doctor Maldonado at the 14th Annual U.S. Psychiatric & Mental Health Congress in honor of his outstanding achievements in, and steadfast dedication to, psychiatry.

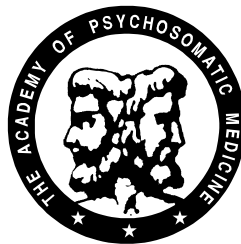
